This edition of the Berks Art Alliance Annual Open Juried Exhibition, on view at the Reading Public Museum through Sept. 6, distills 125 artworks from 358 entries and becomes

counties, but from Harrisburg, Scranton, Philadelphia, parts of New Jersey and Delaware. The exhibit, a popular mainstay of the cultural community for 30 years, is presented every other summer, alternating between the museum and the GoggleWorks.

For their judging criteria, the alliance instituted its own provisions that basically require the jurors foremost to seek out excellence in media and composition while using their best judgment as to what moves them in presentation and theme.
